A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE COASTAL BEND COUNCIL OF GOVERNMENTS EXCUTIVE DIRECTOR TO SUBMIT AN APPLICATION TO THE OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR, HOMELAND SECURITY GRANTS DIVISION TO APPLY FOR REALLOCATING FY2019 FUNDING IN THE COASTAL BEND REGION.

WHEREAS, on September 16, 2021 the Homeland Security Advisory Committee met and discussed various options for reallocating FY2019 Homeland Security grant funds in the CBCOG region; the final recommendation to the CBCOG membership is to allow the Coastal Bend Council of Governments to submit an application for the CBMACC Communication Project. The Project will provide (1) P25 Phase 2 Multi-Band Portable Radio to provide deployable communication capability. The radio will be available to the CBCOG 11-County Region Emergency Management Programs and first responders for assistance/support; and

WHEREAS, the Coastal Bend Council of Governments finds it in the best interest of the citizens of the Coastal Bend Council of Governments Region that the CBMACC Communication Project be operated and completed prior to November 01, 2021; and

WHEREAS, the Coastal Bend Council of Governments agrees **not** to provide matching funds for the said project, as matching funds are **not** required; and

WHEREAS, the Coastal Bend Council of Governments agrees that in the event of loss or misuse of the Office of the Governor funds, the Coastal Bend Council of Governments assures that the funds will be returned to the Office of the Governor in full; and

WHEREAS, the Coastal Bend Council of Governments designates the <u>Executive Director</u> as the grantee's authorized official. The authorized official is given the power to apply for, accept, reject, alter or terminate the grant on behalf of the applicant agency.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Coastal Bend Council of Governments membership concurs with the above recommendation and hereby authorizes the <u>Executive Director</u> to prepare and submit a grant application for the CBMACC Communication Project to the Office of the Governor, Homeland Security Grants Division for the FY2019 Re-allocation funding. The <u>Executive Director</u> is further authorized to enter into an agreement with the Homeland Security Grants Division to receive these funds for the purpose stated above.

SUMMARY

The CBCOG region will receive an estimated reallocated amount of \$3,400 from FY19 Homeland Security Program funds that were left over from FY19 regional projects. The HSAC met on August 10, 2021, and concurred to use the funding for the purchase of a P25 Phase 2 Multi-Band Portable Radio to support a deployable command center for the Coastal Bend Multi-Agency Coordination Center. This project will target the lack of operational communication equipment for notification and response coordination, and will be available to the CBCOG 11-County Region Emergency Management Programs and first responders. The HSAC also concurred to have the CBCOG submit an application for this project and allow the CBCOG Homeland Security Program to administer the grant, and maintain the piece of equipment.

Congregate Meals

Service definition

Hot or other appropriate meal served to an eligible older adult which meets 33% percent of the dietary reference intakes established by the Food and Nutrition Board of the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences and complies with the most recent Dietary Guidelines for Americans, published by the Secretary of Agriculture, and which is served in a congregate setting. The objective is to reduce food insecurity and promote socialization of older adults.

Detailed description of how service is provided

Coastal Bend's congregate meals are mostly designed around county service areas. The region-wide network consists of 32 senior centers and nutrition sites located throughout the 11-county service area with services delivered through 2 contracts and 6 vendor agreements. The contracts and vendor agreements are performance based with a negotiated unit rate agreed upon for each service, using the HHSC rate setting process. Coastal Bend contracted unit rates (cash unit rates for meals) are at or below the Title III Program statewide average rates, according to current HHSC program analysis. All meal providers recognize 10 holidays annually. All meal providers will increase the number of holidays due to the newly enacted National holiday of "Juneteenth".

Coastal Bend's most populated area, Nueces County, is split into two service areas the City of Corpus Christi and rural Nueces County. The City of Corpus Christi's Parks and Recreation Department has the nutrition contract for the city while rural Nueces County is served by Nueces County. The City of Corpus Christi operates 8 senior centers with 4 of those open 8 hours daily. Nueces County operates 5 senior centers in rural Nueces County with their central kitchen in Robstown.

The Community Action Agency of South Texas provides congregate services in Jim Wells, Brooks, San Patricio and Bee counties, covering the largest square mile service area in our region. The Jim Wells County service area includes senior centers in Alice Premont, Orange Grove and Sandia. There is only one center in rural Brooks County, located in Falfurrias. San Patricio County is considered an urban area, however, there are four rural-type senior centers scattered throughout the county.

AAACB contracts with Kleberg County for nutrition services in both Kleberg and Kenedy counties. Kleberg County has three senior centers - Kingsville, where a long-awaited new senior center was opened in 2013, and small centers in Ricardo and Rivera. Kenedy County (all ranch land) is Coastal Bend's most remote and least populated county having a 60+ population of only 128 persons. Nevertheless, Kleberg County delivers homebound meals to Sarita, the only town in Kenedy County.

Although Duval County is also very rural and has a small 60+ population (2,977 persons), the nutrition program has strong support from the county and operates 4 senior centers. Approximately 67% of meals are provided with local funds.

The Aransas County Council on Aging, a small local non-profit organization, has the home delivered meals contract for Aransas County. For a small operation, they are especially successful in their fundraising efforts. Their only congregate meal site is in the City of Rockport. Because of Winter Texans, meal counts in Rockport fluctuate greatly from season to season.

Live Oak County has one senior center in Three Rivers and Title III supports only home delivered meals in Live Oak County. Home delivered meals delivery expanded to include the remote areas of Whitsett and Nell. The county also serves other remote areas - Ray Point, Sandia area and the remote retirement areas of Lagarto and Swinney Switch.

Refugio County home delivered meals is supported by Title III Funding. In a cooperative effort with the Refugio County Jail, Title III meals are prepared by the jail kitchen staff using Regional menus and Title III guidelines and are delivered 5 days per week. Refugio is delivering meals twice per week and providing frozen meals on those days they don't deliver. This is due to the shortage of drivers and the distance to deliver to some of the consumers.

The AAACB Nutrition Consultant, Jean Fields, MS, RD, LD, is contracted to write all regional menus, provide all recipes, prepare nutritional analysis, menu worksheets, facilitate regional cooperative purchasing including writing bid specs, provide technical assistance and training to all nutrition directors and kitchen staff and analyze nutrition program equipment/supply needs. She also prepares nutrition education materials and provides annual training how to provide one-onone nutrition education and complete the Nutrition Risk Assessment. The contracted Nutrition Consultant also works closely with nutrition providers so that all meals meet the Dietary Reference Intake (DRI) requirements including frozen and shelf stable meals, while at the same time, containing costs as much as possible.

A All eight nutrition providers participate in regional menu planning and cooperative purchasing. A TEXAS 20 Purchasing Cooperative Inter-Local Agreement was initiated with Region 20 Education Service Center (ESC) in FY16 and continues to this day for purchasing food, milk and food related supplies. The contracted Nutrition Consultant writes food, milk and paper product specifications for all nutrition providers. Product specifications and forecasted quantities for the region

Corpus Christi Initiative with community partners to increase public awareness and understanding of those living with dementia and their caregivers. CAREGIVER RESPITE CARE - INSTITUTIONAL - AAACB/ADRC will provide Caregiver Respite Care-Institutional providing temporary relief for caregivers including an array of services provided in a congregate or residential setting (e.g. hospital, nursing home, or day activity and health services) to a dependent older person who is in need of supervision. Services will be offered on a short-term, temporary basis while the primary caregiver is unavailable or needs relief. When appropriate, services may include meals, social and recreational activities, personal care, monitoring of health status, medical procedures and transportation. This will be when the Care Recipient; is unable to perform a minimum of two activities of daily living identified through the CNE, or due to a cognitive or other mental impairment, requires substantial supervision because the older person behaves in a manner that poses a serious health or safety hazard to themselves or to another person. Added 9/16/2021 AAACB/ADRC provides Legal Assistance (benefits counseling) in-house through one full time lead benefits counselor, one part-time contracted position and support from 2 backup AAA staff that are certified benefits counselors. AAACB/ADRC benefits counselors often perform advocacy roles on behalf of the caller, using 3-way calling as necessary to assist in resolving service problems that frequently relate to communication issues. Currently AAACB has a total of five Benefits Counselors as part of AAA staff. Three as certified Benefits Counselors II, two are Benefits Counselors I, with plans to have at a minimum two certified for Advance Planning Assistance in FY2021-2022. In addition, the AAA also contracts with one nutrition provider, the City of Corpus Christi, who has two certified benefits counselors II that assist seniors at their centers. City counselors also assist with appointments in the AAA office during peak Part D Open Enrollment season. Lastly AAACB has one contracted Care Coordinators as Benefits Counselors II who as needed, provide benefits counseling during in-home visits. They also provide legal awareness presentations, outreach and assist with health fairs. Legal assistance activities are well integrated with a close working relationship between AAACB benefits counselors and other Access and Assistance staff (providing benefits counseling back-up), the Texas Legal Services Center, the Legal Hotline for Older Texans, Texas Department of Insurance, the local Social Security Office, the local Health and Human Services Commission office, Senior Medicare Patrol and our newest partner, the Corpus Christi Bar Association. The Corpus Christi Bar Association in coordination with the State Attorney Mr. Paul Zambie host at a minimum one local clinic to assist with the Transfer on Todd Deed paperwork. Collaboration also exists relating to Benefits Counseling training that is coordinated regionally but supplemented with out-of-region training as well. In FY2021-2022 plans are to work on an Advance Directives Clinic with the collaboration of the Corpus Christi Bar Association. AAA Benefits Counselors, Care Coordinators and other AAA staff sharpen their advocacy skills through routine and complex elder

are provided directly by the AAACB with lead support from the Family Caregiver Specialist. Coastal Bend focuses this activity on more in-depth one-on-one peer counseling of caregivers, educating the caregivers on local resources, materials available through our resource library and assistive technology lab, internet searches on specific caregiving issues, family caregiver education, home provider caregiver and local caregiver seminars. Specialized training and support will continue to be provided through Schmieding Family Caregiver Physical Skills classes, Schmieding Family Caregiver Dementia classes, Virtual Dementia Tours (sensitivity training), Caregiver Stress Busting classes and Family Caregiver Training. AAACB Family Caregiver Specialist takes the lead in facilitating these classes. For Stress Busting classes, she is supported by contracted Master Trainers and volunteers. The AAACB maintains a close working relationship with the Alzheimer's Association - collaborating on seminars, client referrals and other local projects. The AAACB now houses the Care House this dedicated space is used for Stress Busting classes, Schmeiding Family Caregiver classes and Virtual Dementia Tours - plans are to continue this program into FY2021-2022. Presently. the AAACB Direct Purchase of Services Pool has 21 vendor agreements 15 with home health agencies, 3 adult day cares, 1 Senior Companion Program, 2 vendors for residential repairs and 1 vendor for various health maintenance items. These vendors are used when all other avenues of assistance are exhausted and frail, homebound individuals or their caregivers direly need assistance. Services purchased under this arrangement include Personal Assistance, Caregiver Respite - In-home Caregiver Respite - Institutional (includes Adult Day Care), minor Residential Repairs and Health Maintenance. Caregiver Respite Care - Vouchers are also offered. Health Maintenance includes such items as bathroom safety bars, high rise toilets, pocket talkers and other assistive aides. Residential Repairs are limited to accessibility improvements such as ramps, widening of doorways or tub to shower conversions. All purchases are made on a client-by-client basis after a service appropriate assessment. Personal Assistance and Respite Services are short term in nature and generally focus on older persons who have recently gone through a health care crisis or caregivers needing respite from their 24/7 caregiving tasks. Base costs for personal care and respite are quite often the same as HHSC CSOP's contracted rates for non-priority (non-participant) clients. Home health vendors are also HHSC vendors so that when a consumer is approved for HHSC CSOP, the transition is seamless for the consumer. Families are also educated on their option to use HHSC Consumer Directed Services and/or services through AAACB's Voucher-Caregiver Respite Care for in-home or institutional respite. By using the voucher system for nursing home respite, the caregiver can choose from any of the nursing homes in the Coastal Bend, as long as space is available, the nursing home can meet their needs and is willing to accept

when AAA staff makes home visits in rural areas, they often make site visits to local senior centers, giving technical assistance as needed, networking with center staff and giving/receiving appropriate referrals and also making legal awareness presentations. Homemaker - AAACB will provide homemaker services which will be a service provided by a trained and supervised homemakers involving the performance of housekeeping and home management, meal preparation, or escort tasks and shopping assistance provided to an older person who requires assistance with these activities in their place of residence. This service will allow the recipient to sustain independent living in a safe and healthful home environment. This service will be provided when necessary in the case of unexpected disaster declaration by the State in which funds are allocated for this purpose. Updated 9/16/2021 Income Support – The AAACB will provide assistance with income support in the form of a payment to a third-party provider for services or goods that support the basic needs of person, on behalf of an older person or their caregiver. This service will be provided when necessary in the case of unexpected disaster declaration by the State in which funds are allocated for this purpose. Updated 9/16/2021 National Family Caregiver Support Program (NFCSP) provides a multifaceted system of support services for family caregivers, including grandparents or other older individuals who are relative caregivers, and integrated very well into other AAACB support programs. Caregiver Information Services includes a caregiver lending library "Hopes Closet" (named in honor of a previous staff member) lending wheelchairs, shower chairs, walkers, crutches, canes and also providing adult incontinent supplies. A caregiver newsletter that is mailed monthly reaches more than 1,500 caregivers and professionals with electronic/hard copies mailed and on a monthly basis, a grandparents newsletter that reaches more than 200 two to three times a year, monthly support groups, school group presentations, mass media program outreach, training events on caregiving topics, health fairs, information on community resources, and how to access those services. The AAACB Aging Resource Library includes specialized sections on caregiving for caregivers of individuals with Alzheimer's disease, as well as resources available for grandparents and other relatives raising children. NFCSP has been particularly successful at coordination with other local groups, both public and private. These collaborative efforts include planning the annual Grandparents and Other Relatives Raising Children Conference (attended by over 500 grandparents and professionals annually) in close partnership with the City of Corpus Christi, Corpus Christi ISD. Community Action Agency's Head Start Programs, local HHSC, Texas A&M Agri-Life, Methodist Children's Home and local university Other examples of NFCSP agency collaborations include the University of Michigan cognitive study group for the Virtual Dementia Tour, annual Building a Bridge Symposium for Families and Professionals, annual Alzheimer's Symposium (geared toward both professionals and family members), local Walk for Memory Face to Face, Alzheimer's Memory Walk, family

As actual carryover was awarded to AAA, balance of Note that \$87,333 of these funds will be reported under Disaster Flex IIIB and another \$182,943 will be reported under Disaster Flex IIIE. The remainder of \$320,299 is from PY CARES C2. (320,299+87,333+182943=\$590,675).
